2024 Winter Sports Clinic was Snow Good

he 2024 Winter Sports Clinic for Veterans with Disabilities in New Hampshire was once again a mountain of success for everyone involved. The VA Boston Healthcare System and White River Junction VA Healthcare System co-host the New England Winter Sports Clinic each year, and it has grown into the second largest adaptive Winter Sports Clinic offered to veterans throughout the entire country. The opening ceremonies were held on Monday afternoon, January 8th at the James W. Campion III Ice Rink in West Lebanon, NH, where veterans from across New England gathered to participate in adaptive sled hockey and skating. Some were returning participants and for others this was their very first time. Tuesday through Thursday was spent with the New England Healing Sports Association (NEHSA) at Mount Sunapee in Newbury, NH where veterans and caregivers learned adaptive skiing and snowboarding. Pickleball, rhythmic drumming, and arts and crafts were offered as an alternative to adaptive sports activities. By all accounts the week was enormously well received by those in attendance, with many commenting that this year's Clinic was one of the best that has ever been hosted. So, I guess in the future it's all downhill from here!

Chapter Board of Director and Vice-President Mike Moran participated in the Clinic throughout the entire week, where he was able to connect with many friends, both new and old. Mike shared the following: "The weather conditions were in our favor with the snow and the temperatures, and over 150 registered volunteers made the planning for the Clinic go off without a hitch. The

Washington Update

PVA Releases 2024 Policy Priorities

he second session of the 118th Congress is officially underway. This year, we will continue to work with our champions on pushing forward legislation and regulations that support our priorities. Congress will be in session fewer days this year than last year because of the pending November elections. Regardless, we will work to push access forward this year and believe we will see some of our key priorities over the finish line.

Our priorities for this year are as follows:

- Protect Access to VA's Specialized Health Care Services
- Expand Access to VA Long-Term Services and Supports
- Improve VA Benefits and Health Care Services for Paralyzed Veterans and their Survivors
- Protect the Civil Rights of People with Disabilities
- Improve Access to Social Security Benefits
- Increase Employment Prospects for Veterans with Disabilities

Other DAMA-related bills addressed in the markup include

HVAC Holds Full Committee Markup

n December 5, the House Veterans' Affairs Committee (HVAC) held a full committee markup discussing bills that advanced from the Economic Opportunity (EO) and Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs (DAMA) Subcommittees.

All of the bills discussed, several of which are being tracked by PVA, successfully advanced through the markup. PVA priority, H.R. 3790, the Justice for ALS Veterans Act, was among those bills that is now ready for the House floor. As a reminder, surviving spouses of a service-connected veteran may be eligible for dependency and indemnity (DIC) benefits. The current rate for DIC is \$1,562. For veterans that lived for at least eight-years with their service-connected injury, spouses may be eligible for the DIC "kicker," an additional \$331 each month. The Justice for ALS Veterans Act would authorize the surviving spouse of a veteran who dies from ALS to receive the DIC "kicker" in the event their spouse died before the eight-year requirement.

one that would address disparities for women veterans who served in combat when seeking VA benefits, one that seeks to improve transparency at the Board of Veterans' Appeals, a fraud reimbursement bill, and also a bill that ensures a veteran's claims cannot be denied simply because they miss a compensation and pension (C&P) exam.

From the EO Subcommittee there were bills that would improve several aspects of VA education benefits, including increasing transparency around institutions of higher learning, expanding the housing allowance during summer sessions, and decreasing barriers for women veterans applying to the Edith Nourse Rogers STEM Scholarship. There were also other bills that would improve the transition process, address portability of some licenses for medical providers who offer C&P exams, and allow veterans to use the Auto Grant to cover the cost of shipping their adaptive vehicle.

NEPVA Members invited to participate in a documentary on the 2024 election

The National Disability Rights Network, a leading national disability rights organization, is working on a documentary short that will tell the stories of voters with disabilities in the lead up to the 2024 presidential election. We will be doing interviews in Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, South Carolina, Virginia and the District of Columbia. We want to capture the issues that motivate voters with disabilities and paint a rich picture of their lives, because our community, despite being over 25% of the American population it's often ignored by politicians.

We are seeking to get a look at the home life and day-to-day of voters with disabilities so we can connect the political issues that matter to their daily life. Interviews would take approximately two to three hours. We want to conduct the interview and film footage to complement it. For example: navigating to work, arranging paratransit, going over how much their healthcare costs or showing any durable medical equipment they use, explaining how a home health aide would enable them to experience greater independence.

The goal of this project is to highlight the biggest minority group that often gets ignored by the candidates of all parties. The project is strictly nonpartisan. We are seeking to ensure we have a diverse range of perspectives included in terms of the issues that matter and the life experience those voters come with.

We are looking to speak to first time and longtime voters, we want to interview those fresh out of school (and even graduating seniors) as well as people who have spent a long time in the workforce or even found themselves excluded from the workforce. We want to speak to voters with disabilities of all stripes and capture the diversity of our community.

Service Officers Report

s we return back from the holiday season and have officially entered the new year, I sincerely hope that everyone had a safe and happy holiday.

Many of our veterans have dependents. Whether that be their spouses or their school aged children. One of the most common questions we receive from our veterans is "Will my family get anything after I die?". I wanted to do a brief rundown of one of the most commonly sought benefits for survivors, which is Dependency Indemnity Compensation (DIC).

DIC is a tax-free monetary benefit paid to surviving spouses, children, and in some cases surviving parents on a monthly basis. There are certain eligibility requirements that will be described in the following paragraphs.

Eligibility for DIC requires the veteran to have met certain requirements. They must have either:

- 1.) Died while on active duty, active duty for training, or inactive duty for training. Or;
- 2.) Died as a result of a service connected disease or injury. Or;

3.) If the death is not due to the above criteria, they were rated permanent and totally disable for purposes of VA compensation for one of the following lengths of time:

- 1.) Rated totally disabled for at least 10 years prior to death. Or;
- 2.) Since the release from active duty and 5 years until death. Or;
- 3.) For 1 year prior to death if a former prisoner of war.

For surviving spouses to be eligible, the veteran must meet one of the above noted criteria and also must have:

- 1.) Lived with the veteran without break until death. Or:
- 2.) If separated, they were not at fault for separation

And must also meet one of the below criteria:

- 1.) Married the Veteran or service member within 15 years of their discharge from the period of military service during which the qualifying illness or injury started or got worse. Or;
 - 2.) Were married to the veteran for at least one year. Or;
 - 3.) Had a child with the veteran.

Please note: that if the surviving spouse remarries after January of 2021, they will only be allowed to continue receiving DIC if they are over the age of 55. The eligibility criteria for surviving children to receive DIC is the same however they have some different eligibility requirements.

For children: They must be:

- 1.) unmarried, and
- 2.) not on the surviving spouse's award, and
- 3.) must be under 18 (23 if in school).

Surviving parents may be eligible to receive DIC as well. However, there are different requirements. In order for a parent to be eligible, they must be:

1.) The biological, adoptive, or foster parent of the veteran, and they must have income below a certain threshold. (Note: income limits for 2024 can be found at the link below;

Applying for DIC is done on a 21p-534 EZ; APPLICA-TION FOR DIC, SURVIVORS PENSION, AND/OR ACCRUED BENEFITS. If you are not receiving DIC, and believe that you may be entitled, please reach out to your nearest National Service Officer for assistance.

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Improvements Made to Total and Permanent Disability Student Loan Discharge

The U.S. Department of Education has been making improvements to the Total and Permanent Disability (TPD) Discharge of people with student loans and they want to get the word out to all eligible veterans. Several steps in the forgiveness process have now been streamlined to increase engagement.

There are three ways student loans can be discharged by the Department of Education due to TPD: through the VA, the Social Security Administration, or by a medical professional. For more information on eligibility for TPD forgiveness, you can review the criteria here.

The Department of Education and VA have systems that communicate with one another so veterans rated 100 percent service connected should have seen an automatic discharge of their loans already. If you are rated at 100 percent and have not seen your federal student loans forgiven, or if you are a veteran that has seen your loans discharged, please reach out to Julie Howell, PVA's Associate Legislative Director, at JulieH@PVA.org.
