I was thinking that there is some wisdom to the tradition of the Commander in Chief talking to all US citizens about the nation's challenges and successes. Leaving the politics out of it, and no matter who the sitting President is, they usually expound upon their legislative wins and what they have done to improve the lives of Americans. The President always gives a kind of summary statement as well, which typically says, "The State of our Union is Strong!"

Serving our Members: Over the last year we have offered many free adaptive sporting and recreation opportunities. These programs empower veterans to grow physically stronger and more confident and provide them with opportunities to travel and build relationships. This is one of the greatest acts of service that we can provide as a Chapter in improving the quality of life for our members. Our NSO's are also indispensable in serving our members and connecting them to VA benefits. In collaboration with our NSO's, we have served and helped many veterans with catastrophic disabilities who encounter barriers in their communities by empowering them to advocate for the removal of those barriers. At a time in this nation when many government services are underfunded, we help to fill an important void. Without our assistance, many paralyzed veterans in New England would not have proper access to the benefits, services, and rights they have earned through their honorable service.

NEPVA Veterans with MS Program: In February 2023, we launched this program to create activities and resources geared towards a growing population of paralyzed veterans. The program is managed collaboratively by Board of continued on page 3

Director Chuck Houle and staff member Kristen McCone Gordon. We offered several events specific to our members with MS and geared to their interests and abilities. We co-hosted an adaptive "Learn to Curl" event in partnership with Home Base, hosted information Zoom sessions for members, established the NEPVA Veterans with MS Committee, and prioritized effective communication with members by creating flyers, sending direct mailings, and producing newsletter articles and Facebook posts on program activities.

A Strong Government Relations Program: Because 2023 marked the beginning of a congressional session, with Kristen McCone Gordon's leadership we placed an emphasis on federal congressional outreach. We changed our Chapter's strategy for our annual Capitol Hill visits to reflect a growing advocacy team and a new focus on priority legislation impacting caregivers. Our Chapter sent a delegation of 6 people to Washington D.C. for the Annual PVA Advocacy and Legislation Seminar (AD/LEG) in March and divided our delegation into teams to cover additional ground. In a 2-day period, our teams met with 17 congressional offices. During last Spring and early Summer, we continued meeting with legislators in their district offices. A highlight of the year was Rep. Larson and Rep. Hayes from Connecticut inviting our Chapter to speak at their joint press conference on critical PVA Social Security legislation and we secured Chapter President and National Director Brad Carlson a speaking role there. We also continued promoting PVA's VoterVOICE platform on our Facebook page, in this CordWord, and at Chapter and community events. In the Fall, Kristen also proposed a new effort for our Chapter: New England PVA AD/LEG 2.0. Kristen, Brad and Kathy Carlson, and I travelled back to Washington, D.C. for more in-person meetings with members of the New England congressional delegation. In addition to the Elizabeth Dole Act and raising concerns about air travel accessibility, we advocated strongly for PVA's Justice for ALS legislation and improving social security benefits for our members.

Strong Chapter Communications: Communicating

regularly with our members, producing and distributing monthly newsletters, and creating public awareness of issues of concern for members has been of utmost importance to our Chapter. This CordWord effectively

and activities. We also email our members regularly to keep them up to date on what is happening in the Chapter. Our Chapter Facebook page has been an increasingly effective way to communicate with and disseminate information to members and friends, and overall engagement on Facebook has increased exponentially over the past year.

Strong Chapter Fundraising Program and Finances: Our Chapter has grown in our financial stability, primarily through increased and successful fundraising efforts. We received generous grants over the last year from The Boston Red Sox Foundation, The Disabled Veterans National Foundation, and The Pilot Company. We also re-engaged current and new donors to support our Chapter's mission while also growing our Chapter's planned giving program. At the end of 2023 we received many generous major gifts and bequests, which enables us to serve and impact our members more effectively.

At this year's State of the Union address, President Biden said "The State of our Union is strong and getting stronger!" Depending on your politics and point of view you may agree or disagree with that. With the points listed above, and although it only scratches the surface of all the many programs and services our Chapter offers, I can say with absolute confidence that the State of our New England PVA Chapter is strong and getting stronger each day.

Washington Update

National President Robert Thomas, Jr. Testifies Before Congress

On March 6, PVA National President Robert Thomas, Jr. testified before a joint session of the Senate and House Veterans' Affairs Committees regarding PVA's public policy priorities. During the hearing, he stressed the need for comprehensive support systems and policies that address the unique challenges faced by our nation's veterans with catastrophic injuries and diseases. President Thomas fervently advocated for legislative initiatives aimed at enabling and empowering disabled veterans, their families, and caregivers. He increased the impact of his message by referencing real-life challenges faced by actual PVA members, like <u>U.S. Army Vet-</u> eran/PVA National Vice President Anne Robinson and her husband, Harry, who are among those unable to hire direct care workers due to the low pay and labor shortages. Throughout his testimony, President Thomas addressed several key policy priorities, including the dire need to protect and strengthen VA's specialized systems of care; address staffing shortages; expand access to long-term care services; improve availability of home and community-based services; and enhance VA benefits for paralyzed veterans and their survivors.

During the Q&A session, President
Thomas was invited to comment on
the process that SCI/D veterans must
follow to get assistive devices through
VA and how the Veterans Spinal Trauma Access to New Devices Act (Vet-

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erans STAND Act) (H.R. 6373) would improve this process. The STAND Act seeks to improve veterans' access to assistive devices that promote independence and mobility. It also directs the VA to do a better job reaching out to SCI/D veterans about the importance of having annual medical exams. President Thomas testified that technologies that improve mobility and independence are great to have and noted that they are improving constantly. Also, he noted that annual exams are extremely important to maintaining the health and wellbeing of SCI/D veterans.

The two-panel hearing lasted nearly three and a half hours. At the start of the second panel, former Senator Elizabeth Dole talked briefly about the Elizabeth Dole Home Care Act, which is now part of an omnibus package of veterans-related legislation currently being negotiated between the House and Senate. She spoke of the bill's importance and urged the two chambers to work together to pass it quickly. You can watch a recording of the hearing here. DOD and VA Announce Expansion of IVF Services

Last month, we highlighted the announcement from the Department of Defense (DOD) and the VA that the departments intended to expand access to in vitro fertilization (IVF) for some veterans and servicemembers. As a reminder, longstanding DOD and VA policies required that servicemembers and veterans be able to produce their own genetic material and the benefit was only allowed for heterosexual married couples.

The DOD and VA have formally announced that both healthcare systems will soon drop the marriage requirement to access care meaning that single and same sex couples will now be able to access the benefit. Additionally, the prohibition on the use of donated genetic materials will be dropped, meaning that veterans and servicemembers can now access donations to facilitate IVF.

The VA policy for IVF has been linked to a DOD policy that originated in the 2012 National Defense Authorization Act. The policy stated that as long as appropriators authorized the resources to provide infertility treatments, then the VA and the DOD were allowed to offer the services. This year's appropriations bill included the resources to offer treatments and services and with both agencies expanding the eligibility criteria, this should allow more veterans and service members access to the benefit. However, veterans still need to have a service connected infertility diagnosis. Thus, we will continue to push forward legislation that includes infertility services in the medical benefits package at the VA which would remove the service connection requirement. While Congress remains focused on passing this year's funding, The Independent Budget (IB) which is formulated by PVA, DAV, and VFW is looking to the future. The report serves as a comprehensive roadmap to ensure VA is fully funded and capable of carrying out its mission to serve veterans and their families, both now and in the future.

The IB's recommendations, coupled with the Administration's fiscal year (FY) 2025 budget proposal, still yet to be released, will be used to guide Congress with its spending decisions for the coming year. For FY 2025, the IB veterans service organizations are recommending \$151.8 billion for the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) to ensure that all veterans choosing VA for their care receive timely and high-quality medical services. The IB report details specific funding levels and targeted increases for VHA programs, including a \$2.8 billion increase to fill clinical and support care vacancies across VHA and a \$1 billion boost in longterm care to account for the increasing number of aging veterans and their need for essential services. We also called on Congress to significantly increase funding for VA's major and minor construction programs and recommend a total of \$6.1 billion for FY 2025.

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Service Officers Report

lowers will bloom soon, as spring is arriving. There is hope that winter is ending. Greeting to all chapter members. This article is a follow-up to the article on DIC written in January 2024 by NSO Zachary Nuetzel and provides some additional information related to DIC.

As Zachary noted in his article "DIC is a tax-free monetary benefit paid to surviving spouses, children, and in some cases surviving parents on a monthly basis. There are certain eligibility requirements which need to meet." In some cases, unfortunately, the VA decides that the veteran has not passed as a result of a service connected disease or injury.

Recently, as part of legislative changes incorporated by the Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics Act of 2022 (aka- PACT ACT), some modifications were made related to previous DIC denials.

Surviving spouses of a veteran who were denied DIC previously for a veteran who had passed from one of the new presumptive conditions added in the Pact Act may request to have those denials re-evaluated (this is due to the Pact Act adding those new presumptive conditions). If the revaluation grants DIC based on one those newly added presumptive conditions, the claimant's (surviving spouse) award for DIC may be assigned retroactively back to the date of submission of the original claim.

As a refresher, we have listed below the presumptive conditions, times frames, and locations on which the above noted re-evaluation of DIC may be based.

Presumptive conditions due to burn pit exposure-Chronic bronchitis, Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, Constrictive bronchiolitis or obliterative bronchiolitis, Emphysema, Granulomatous disease, Interstitial lung disease, Pleuritis, Pulmonary fibrosis. Sarcoidosis, Chronic sinusitis, Chronic rhinitis.

Presumptive cancers due to burn pit exposure: Glioblastoma, Head cancer of any type, Neck cancer of any type, Respiratory (breathing related) cancer of any type, Gastro-intestinal cancer of any type, Reproductive cancer of any type, Lymphoma cancer of any type, Lymphomatic cancer of any type, Kidney cancer, Brain cancer, Pancreatic cancer, Melanoma.

Covered under these presumptions are: Veterans who served on or after August 2, 1990, on active duty in any of the following locations (including the airspace above those locations): Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, United Arab Emirates.

Veterans who served on or after September 11, 2001, on active duty in any of the following locations (including the airspace above those locations): Afghanistan, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Yemen, Uzbekistan

For Vietnam-era veterans the following new conditions are considered presumptive for Agent Orange exposure: Hypertension (High Blood Pressure), MGUS or Monoclonal Gammopathy of Undetermined Significance (a blood disorder which affects plasma within bone marrow).

Veterans who served in below locations are presumed to have exposure to Agent Orange:

- 1) Service in Laos from December 1st, 1965 until Sep tember 30, 1969
- 2) Any U.S. or Royal Thai Military bases in Thailand from January 9, 1962 until June 30, 1976
- 3) Guam or American Samoa or in the territorial waters off of Guam or American Samoa from January 9, 1962, until July 31, 1980
- 4) Johnston Atoll or on a ship that called at Johnston Atoll from January 1, 1972, through September 30,
- 5) Cambodia at Mimot or Krek, Kampong Cham Prov ince from April 16, 1969, through April 30, 1969

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Other service locations for presumption to exposure to Agent Orange:

Service in the Republic of Vietnam, or on a U.S.
 Military vessel that operated in the inland water ways of Vietnam, or on a vessel that operated within 12 nautical miles from Vietnam and Cambodia (Blue Water Navy) from January 9, 1962 until May 7, 1975.

- 2) Service in or near the Korean DMZ from April 1, 1968 until August 31, 1971.
- 3) Service in the Air Force in which the veteran regularly and repeatedly operated, maintained, or served onboard a C-123 aircraft known to have been used to spray an herbicide agent during the Vietnam era.

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f your deceased veteran spouse served in one of time periods noted above, served in one of the locations noted above, and passed from one of the conditions noted above, and you were denied DIC because one of the conditions above was noted/listed as the primary or contributing factors to your spouse's passing, please contact your local PVA office so that they may assist in determining if you are eligible to have the previously denied DIC claim reevaluated.
